DR. RACHAE GOODMAN, PH.D.



Dr. Rachael Goodman joined the Mercer faculty in 2020 as an assistant professor of Global Development Studies. She received her Ph.D. in anthropology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, researching development projects in north India. Although Dr. Goodman did not know exactly which area she wanted to study after her undergraduate degree, she knew that she wanted to do anthropology. Eventually, she found a development-focused NGO in the Himalayas that had been in place for many years. Her work consisted of 18 months of fieldwork in the Himalayas, studying and working with the NGO to see how ideas of well-being shaped economic development projects. After her Ph.D., Dr. Goodman taught anthropology at the University of Southern Mississippi. Her current research explores the impacts of globalization, international volunteering, regional economic change, and shifting ideas of the good life on economic development.

In her spare time, Dr Goodman enjoys making food, especially her favorites from India, and knitting. She also loves spending time with her dog, Kima. She is very passionate about her discipline, and loves keeping up with new journals and studies on development.

Dr. Goodman loves being at Mercer because of the students and her amazing colleagues. She enjoys that the student body is diverse, and that everyone is committed to what they are studying. She loves that the Mercer community fosters student passion and encourages productive discussions.
