



Director's Notes

Flea is brilliantly crafted. Feydeau takes a small, insignificant misunderstanding and turns it on its head to create a deliciously chaotic situation. And yet, the play is very human. It's all about relationships. So much is at stake in the relationships in the play. Communication or lack thereof is a central theme. If Raymonde and Victor Emmanuel could only talk to each other their troubles would disappear, but they are too scared to do so. Raymonde and Lucienne are a Lucy and Ethel of sorts, and are women who, like Lucy, will not be pushed around. They set the play in motion. They take matters into their own hands. All the central characters in Flea are at their most vulnerable. Issues of impotence and fidelity are difficult at any time but especially during a period where these things were simply not discussed. For it to work, actors must bring humanity to the characters. This cast honors that need and rises to the breakneck pace and timing Feydeau demands. We hope you enjoy your evening at the Theatre.

Synapsis

Feydeau's A Flea In Her Ear, adapted by David Ives, features suspicions of infidelity and plots to find it out, a jealous Spaniard, a lecherous doctor, a young man with a terrible speech impediment, a forged letter, and a respectable society man who is a dead ringer for the bellboy at the notorious "Hotel Frisky Puss." The characters all end up at the hotel, where the confusions only pile up before a final, improbable resolution.

He has choreographed, performed and coached theatrical violence in the US, England, and Germany with such companies as The Steppenwolf Theatre, Alabama Shakespeare Festival, Alliance Theatre, and the Georgia Shakespeare Festival. Scot served as Fight Director for the world premiere of Ghost Brothers of Darkland County, written by Stephen King and John Mellencamp.
