Marian is an avid painter, fiber artist, swimmer, and photographer, and her ongoing research interests are visual semiotics and aesthetics. In August, she presented a paper titled "Resisting Sedimentation: Painting and Fluidity" at the International Human Science Research Conference in Bournemouth, United Kingdom, and is currently working on a paper titled "Communicological Reflections on Color, Culture, and Human Perception" for a conference in China this December. She is married to Dr. Frank Macke, who is also on the faculty of Mercer University.

Director's Notes

In Ernest J. Gaines' novel, A Lesson Before Dying, we are asked to confront the entire bitter history of black people in the South. This book is about the ways in which people declare the value of their lives in a time and place in which those lives seemingly count for nothing. It is about the ways in which the imprisoned may find freedom even in the moment of his death. Gaines addresses the basic predicament of what it is to be a human being: a creature striving for dignity in a universe that often denies it.

In Gaines' own words: "I write for the African-American youth in the country, especially the South, so that they can know who they are and where they came from and take pride in it . . . [and for] the white youth in this country, and especially the South, because unless he knows his neighbor of three hundred years, he only knows half his history.


