

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Henrik Ibsen wrote this important work in 1882 in response to widespread uproar over his play, *Ghosts*, which was produced that same year. Outraged by his candid treatment of a forbidden subject, syphilis, the Victorian moralists of the day maligned and censored the play, and Ibsen himself, with every medium at their disposal. The press, the church, and governmental agencies across Europe and England all sought to ban its publication and production. As his response, *An Enemy of the People* exposed many of the societal institutions held to be harbingers of the truth at the time; the democratic process, the will of the majority, the press, elected officials, family, all represented by rational and educated people who one would not expect to agree to compromising the health of others for personal gain.

As we approach our own Caring for Creation Conference later this month, I am struck by how this play resonates with a variety of issues relevant to our lives. For example, debate about Global Warming rages on while the polar ice caps visibly recede. Whether, as is argued, it is our constant industrial practice, or a normal cycle of the planet, the thought that one would argue the condition does not exist seems quite daft given the evidence. Yet rational, educated scientists on both sides present opposing sides of the issue. Often, the debates descend into ad hominem attacks by these same individuals while they examine NASA photographs and use them to describe two very different events unfolding. One need only spend a few minutes researching on the Internet to see that the issue has left the realm of science and is now a major political issue. Much of the political dilemma has to do with how much financial and personal sacrifice we might be willing to endure in order to address the environmental problem. The characters inhabiting the world of Ibsen's work this evening wrestle with a similar issue, and you may well hear arguments presented that are happening on campus this very day.

In Ibsen's work from 1882 production, we hear shades of our public debate on health care, public finance, the sanctity of democracy, the distribution of wealth, trade, the environment, and somewhere underneath it all, a basic truth that will require one to make a moral decision based on principle, or personal interest. Ibsen does not allow anyone to turn away.
