

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

We felt compelled to produce Johnna Adam's work from the moment we read it. It is a provoking piece, but, more importantly, it speaks honestly to a difficult situation that the characters cannot handle with polite discourse. It requires a more direct approach. Gidion's Knot was first published in American Theatre Magazine and was soon being produced around the nation for its interpersonal intensity and relevance. As Johnna is quoted, "You have to give yourself permission to write in a way that would horrify the people you love."

The characters in *Gidion's Knot* are a mother and a teacher, and the setting is a parent-teacher conference. This is already a fraught situation even before Adams starts ratcheting up the tension. It's worth noting that the topics of conversation in this play reflect several recent events involving schools that have drawn national attention. This is also a play that is steeped in classical history. The title, of course, is a reference to the Gordian Knot, which Alexander the Great sliced through rather than untangle. The play references epic Gaelic poetry, including both its violent imagery and disputes over its authorship—scholars have concluded that the epic poems of Ossian were actually written in English by James Macpherson in the 18th century, despite his claims of having discovered and translated ancient manuscripts. There is a reference to Seneca, the Roman dramatist and advisor to the Emperor Nero. The classroom setting includes images of Greek and Hindu gods keeping watch over the scene.

We chose to cast Mercer Alumna, Sheri Wilson, and local professional actor, Kelly Mann, so that the production would start the year off quickly with a hard-hitting, compelling work. Student Lighting Designer, Annie Fair, brought her newly developed talents to the team as we rehearsed for the weeks before class began, and we are proud of her contribution. We also gave Assistant Professor Frani Geiger Rollins, newly minted as our Professor of Design, a chance to at least get in the door before she gets to work on *She Kills Monsters* ... yes; she has to make monsters for the next show. You'll see....

He has choreographed, performed and coached theatrical violence in the US, England, and Germany with such companies as The Steppenwolf Theatre, Alabama Shakespeare Festival, Alliance Theatre, and the Georgia Shakespeare Festival. Scot served as Fight Director for the world premiere of Ghost Brothers of Darkland County, written by Stephen King and John Mellencamp. He has also served as tactics choreographer and gun wrangler for film and television, and on-set Swordmaster for the Bollywood Epic, DRONA, filmed in Jaipur, India. Most recently, Scot co-choreographed the Alliance Theatre's acclaimed production of One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest with his wife, Kelly, As a director, he received a Meritorious Achievement Award for his direction of Scapin, by the Kennedy Center/ American College Theatre Festival in 2005.

Kelly Martin Mann (Heather Clark) is a Certified Teacher with the Society of American Fight Directors (SAFD), and an advanced actor combatant with the British Academy of Stage and Screen Combat (BASSC), as well as a proud member of Actor's Equity and SAG. Kelly works primarily as a freelance actor, choreographer, and stunt person.
