PLAYWRIGHT'S NOTES

When I started thinking about this script, I knew I wanted to write something that its primary audience – college students - could relate to. Though the characters in the play are a little younger, they're facing challenges that are common to most young people. They're preparing for a new and more independent phase of their lives, and the uncertainties that come with it... what the future will be like, how their relationships will change, and what their place in the world will be.

However, for these characters, this transition period is rockier, as they must deal with a new reality of grief and loss. Having experienced the death of a loved one when I was in high school, I wanted to explore this subject in "Graduation Story." Not only because I believe that I write best when I'm writing from experience, but because grief is such a powerful source of conflict. Though a group of people may lose the same person, they all experience that loss differently, and they all react differently. Grief can bring out the best in people, and the worst, but it always changes them.

And I think that's what this story is ultimately about – change. Whether it's graduation from high school or college, the loss of a friend, or some other event... change is always going to come. My question is, how do we deal with it? How do we allow it to affect our relationships; how do we know when to hold on and when to let go? The play's finished, but I'm still working on that.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

The Theatre program's Playwriting class in the spring of '08 presented several evenings of original one acts. The energy of the performances and the enthusiastic participation of the audience reminded me that Theatre is at its most effective when it directly reflects the community in which it is presented. I think it imperative that the voices of our students are heard on our stage, and it has been a privilege to direct the contemporary work that Alice Wiley has developed over the last year. Mercer's Theater students, and members of the broader Mercer community, represent a multidimensional pool of talent and skills. Tonight's performance is student written, student performed, student designed from lights to sound, student run from the stage manager's booth to backstage, and represents many long hours of hard work and dedication to the craft.
