Director's Notes

When we decided to produce *The Importance of Being Earnest* we knew we had the most important ingredient for a strong production: a truly magnificent work of dramatic literature. At each turn, Oscar Wilde kept us engaged with the dry, sparkling, engaging, and charming wit of these delightful characters. Cast members who were not familiar with the piece were delighted from the first read. Indeed, it was often difficult to continue due to the laughter in the room. This gift from Wilde deserved our best efforts, and the cast and entire production team hope very much that we have done justice to this timeless work.

Oscar Wilde died 100 years ago. In fact, he died on 30 November 1900, penniless, in Paris (ironic since he wrote the same fate for Jack's imaginary brother in *Earnest*). His comedies are not just funny; they are serious, if you dare to notice it. With *The Importance of Being Earnest*, Wilde boldly satirizes Victorian ideals, and the society he satirizes flocks to the theatre to watch itself being roasted on the sharp skewer of Oscar Wilde's wit. Much of our society is obsessed with surfaces, as well, and you might just notice a parallel or two to our own times if you look closely. It is, after all, how a play gains the title "timeless".
