
# MERCER UNIVERSITY THEATRE COMING UP NEXT AT THE BACK DOOR THEATRE

Hope. We've been looking for it, lately. We've elected a president in search of it. We're looking for it with reports of every economic indicator in the news. On our own campus we work for it with our conferences and community efforts. And, in the Back Door Theatre, we work long hours, fight back the literal floods of water from the walls, and practice the craft of Theatre focused on the hope of opening night. Playwright Beth Henley has always presented us with characters that defy categorization. Beth Henley's humor is often dark, but from this darkness we find ourselves engaging in the eternal hope of the characters she weaves for us.
