

### DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Choosing a play to produce as part of an academic program involves finding a script that not only appeals to the community/audience and will complement the other selections in a given season, but also one that will challenge and develop the talent of aspiring young actors and the artistic staff. David lives' collection of one-act plays offered just such an opportunity.

At mid-term, after finishing an intensive rehearsal and performance period with A Midsummer Night's Dream, directed by Scot Mann, I wasn't certain how many students would be available to audition, and I was fully prepared to double cast roles as needed. But the enthusiasm and the talent pool at auditions were both broad and deep.

Jean Scharfenberg, a noted director with whom I worked in Illinois, believes that casting is the most crucial decision a director makes. For me, casting is a puzzle that involves chemistry and imagery, responsiveness and music, play and hard work, magic and logic. This particular group of young actors performing for you tonight made my "most crucial decision" almost foolproof. They are, without a doubt, one of the most exciting and cohesive groups to grace Mercer's stage in my 27-year history with this theatre program.

With discipline, creativity, fearlessness, and openness, our rehearsals became a quest to peel away the existential questions of these plays, and mine the layers of comedy within its language(s). In this work, we found laughter, insight, community, and (at least temporarily) we have allowed our "truth-aches" to be healed.
