

Director's Notes

When the artistic staff began our discussions about George F. Walker's Zastrozzi: The Master of Discipline, we were faced with a play that revealed new layers of meaning with each reading. What seems simple becomes more complex at the individual level for each character, as well as the larger, philosophical overtone of the piece. It is plays of this nature that excite and challenge us as artists, and the enthusiasm for this work has carried us to opening night without fail.

I must take a moment to lay accolades at the feet of our Artistic Staff. Professor Zielinski's scenic and lighting designs are nothing short of brilliant. Her vision, use and definition of space, and attention to detail serve to not only illuminate plot and character, but are works of art unto themselves. Shelley Kuhen's costume design, use of color, and construction rival that of any professional company (including the Steppenwolf and the Alliance) and has never failed to enliven and complete the work of the performers. And our Technical Director, Zach Broome, develops the building techniques and solutions that no contractor will ever experience, and has worked for much of this production in a dark theatre, alone. Local Director Jim Crisp offered his trained eye to the work so that the director could find focus as an actor. Our Stage Manager, Tory Johnson, brings a new level of professionalism to the post. I would challenge anyone to produce such a world-class production team with this level of talent and experience at a similar institution.

Our ensemble represents a group of talented and skilled individuals. It is often said in the industry that quality acting is ninety-percent effort, tenpercent talent. I would pose that these artists represent a group that has equal amounts of both! Text analysis requires a careful, intelligent approach. The delivery of a character that not only stands as a three-dimensional reality, but also succeeds in carrying a story in the context of the ensemble, requires a mature awareness of one's emotional

possibilities. And the energy required to sustain focus throughout weeks of rehearsal and hours of performance require a disciplined mind and trained physical instrument. Guest Artist Kelly Martin put our cast through challenging conditioning workouts. Mercer Student Lauren Lunsford challenged us with articulation and physical exercises she learned at the American Conservatory Theatre. Hours of rehearsal were devoted to Stage Combat, a challenging discipline unto itself. Please don't ask them how they "learned all those lines" (that's the least of their efforts). Their dedication and talent brought all these challenging elements together to tell the story that you witness this evening. In addition, this is a cast that not only practices their craft, but also throw their efforts into paint and glued-covered work calls like professionals. No divas, here.

Lastly, a thank you from Mercer Theatre to the Mercer Community. Your support of this collaborative and unique art is an impressive characteristic of our Mercer family. Our Faculty keep our students engaged with our work, and we strive to continue quality programming worthy of this engagement! Without the support of our Dean's office, the new lighting system (which replaced a twenty year-old system) would not have materialized, and the lighting you will see before you this evening would be dramatically different, as would our ability to instruct a significant portion of our curriculum. Our Administration is dedicated to an improved faculty to further expand our program for the University, and the local community. And our students not only attend, but work behind the scenes at every level. What an amazing combination!
